Each year we choose to highlight Australian music and composers in the festival. Bush ballads are a folk music and poetry tradition passed down from generation to generation. They bring to life stories of living in the wide-open countryside of Australia. Our next song, 'The Wild Colonial Boy' has been arranged by Australian composer Ian Jefferson. It is an exciting adaptation of a well-known story about bushranger Jack Doolan... who terrorized the Victorian countryside before facing a dramatic standoff with three troopers.

Our next song.... 'Shackleton'....by Australian composer Paul Jarman.... is one of the greatest stories of survival in the history of exploration. It is considered to be the last great polar journey of the "Heroic Age of Exploration". Whilst circumnavigating Antarctica, 28 men on the ship 'Endurance' were trapped in the ice. Due to the heroic efforts of Captain Ernest Shackleton, the crew were finally rescued 21 months after they began their journey. Not one member of the crew was lost! After their enormous hardship, they sadly returned to a world engulfed in war.

Our soloist for this song is again: **VIYANA KHODAKARAM** from **DALMAIN** Primary School.

Compere 1:

Our commissioned work for this year is 'Against the Odds' by Australian composer Mark Puddy. In March 1907, at Bonnievale,.... near Coolgardie in Western Australia,.... Modesto Varischetti, a miner, was trapped in a mine which had flooded due to heavy rain. After nine days he was rescued thanks to the heroic efforts of the mining community. In this incredible race against time;.... ingenuity, bravery, doggedness and sheer desperation from many different people combined to save a man's life.

Compere 2:

Mines inspector Josiah Crabb was responsible for not giving up on the possibility that Varischetti might be alive. His seven year old son, Frank, suggested that a diver could get down into the watery depths to save him. A special train from Fremantle brought the required air hoses and two divers, Frank Hughes and Tom Hearn, who were able to effect the rescue. Varischetti's heroic tale was truly 'Against the Odds'.

Students from _____ Primary schools, can be collected from the St Georges Terrace side exit doors on the terrace level. All other students can be collected from the balcony exit doors on the river side.

In order to access these doors, you will need to exit the Concert Hall foyer and walk up the ramp or stairs to get to the St Georges terrace level. Continue on, around the sides of the hall to access the balcony doors.

Doors will be clearly marked with school names. Due to safety reasons, choirs will not be brought to their collection points until the hall is empty. To make this process run smoothly and quickly, we ask that only one parent or caregiver, per child, goes to the collection point.
